International Church Relations Conference: Planting a flower in the gate of hell

Ninety-seven representatives from 46 countries and 41 LCMS sister church bodies, along with six other church bodies with whom The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) is working toward fellowship, gathered Oct. 21–25 in Wittenberg, Germany, for the International Church Relations Conference 2024 (ICRC24) to study God's Word, encourage and support one another, and promote global confessional Lutheranism.

The church bodies in attendance represented 95% of the LCMS' global sister church bodies. Sister church bodies are those churches with whom the LCMS shares altar and pulpit fellowship — that is, they agree in the doctrine of the Gospel in all its articles; in the right use of the Holy Sacraments; and confess the inspired, inerrant Holy Scriptures as the only rule and norm of faith and practice and the *Book of Concord* as a faithful exposition of the Word of God (quia subscription).

The group met under the theme "Christ the Lord of History, Yesterday, Today and Forever," based on Hebrews 13:8: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." The Rev. Dr. Jonathan E. Shaw, director of LCMS Church Relations, explained: "This theme was selected because it shows the power and the victory of Jesus Christ from the very beginning, even from before time."

The conference revolved around the study of God's Word and discussion of that Word in relation to caring for Lutheran congregations around the globe. The Rev. Dr. Janis Vanags, archbishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Latvia (LELB), preached on the importance of meditating on God's Word: "Luther said that we need to rub God's Word in our fingers like aromatic herbs and inhale its fragrance. We need to ruminate on it like a cow, not [letting it pass in] through one ear in and through one ear out."

The nine conference presenters helped the attendees ruminate on God's Word by breaking the theme into three temporal perspectives: yesterday, today and forever. Yesterday addressed matters related to creation, Old Testament narrative and re-ordering the image of God. The middle section, "Christ the Lord of History *Today*," addressed a threefold emphasis of witness, mercy and church planting. Finally, the last section looked to the future and end times by discussing the church's worship, the church's confession standing before the throne of God, and Christ's gracious promise and presence in sacramental remembrance.

Attendees gathered daily for Matins and Vespers, with Divine Service celebrated on Wednesday, Oct. 23. The service demonstrated the diversity of the attendees. The opening versicles were sung in Swahili, the Responsory in German and the Kyrie in Spanish. "These different languages help us all, in a concrete way, honor where God has called us and who we are in that context," Shaw said, emphasizing that though the language of worship might be diverse, the churches gathered for the conference are united in their singular confession. Most services were held in St. Mary's, the parish church in Wittenberg, where Martin Luther preached.

That they may be one

The Rev. Dr. Jon Bruss, president of Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, explained the importance of this gathering: "One of the duties of the Synod ... is to find those throughout the world with whom you do share a confession. Why? Because the Lord Jesus prays, *ut unum sint*, 'that they may be one.' This [conference] is one way of expressing that unity we have through faith in Christ and our Baptism around the shared Means of Grace."

This includes supporting and encouraging one another. The Rev. Helmut Paul, bishop of the Free Evangelical Lutheran Synod in South Africa (FELSISA), said: "The great opportunity here is the brotherly support. We see that, as we serve in various countries, there's a lot of overlap in terms of the challenges and problems."

LCMS President Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison pointed to both political and religious issues facing global Lutheranism. He noted that churches in Ukraine, Russia, Sudan, South Sudan, South America and many other places face political conflict. In India, the difficulty is increasing: "The Hindu government is increasingly making life difficult for our partner church in India ... impinging on the rights of minorities."

But that's not all: "The Europeans face gross secularism. ... Recent polls showing virtually all of Germany [is unchurched]. About 10% of the population are Christians or claim to be Christians," Harrison said.

On Sept. 30, 2025, Vanags will complete his term as archbishop and retire from service to the LELB. In his sermon — his last to the ICRC in his role as archbishop — he expressed the sentiment of the gathering: "The 21st century reminds me of a scene from that movie, 'Gladiator.' Maximus stands in the middle of the arena for the battle and says to his comrades, 'Whatever comes out of these gates, we have a better chance of survival if we work together.' Dear sisters and brothers, that is ... why we are here. However, to work together, we need someone to lead and hold us together. It can only be Christ, the resurrected and living One."

Harrison praised Vanags' service during the collapse of communism and his unwavering commitment to the Word of God and the Lutheran Confessions: "It was our great privilege to partner with him and the Latvian church in numerous ways." Turning to Vanags, he said, "The whole catholic and apostolic church thanks you for your wonderful confession."

Planting a flower

In the face of these difficulties, it might be tempting to give up and turn inward, hoping to preserve what little it appears the church has. However, church leaders at the ICRC24 conference remained hopeful. The Rev. Juan Pablo Lanterna, president of the Confessional Lutheran Church of Chile, encouraged attendees to "plant a flower in the gate of hell."

When asked what this meant, Lanterna explained: "The Gospel [seems] very small sometimes, but God has promised to the church that [He] will save the people. ... So, we believe the Word of God; and we have to preach, preach; and this flower will grow."

The ICRC conferences are one such planting of a flower in the gate of hell. The effect on global Lutheranism often takes years to manifest itself as relationships grow and blossom. Churches and church leaders gather, share concerns, learn from one another and encourage each other to remain dedicated to God's Word and the Lutheran Confessions.

Over time, the effects of these relationships compound. The Rev. Dr. Thomas Egger, president of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, noted how the LCMS seminaries have broadly influenced global Lutheranism: "While I was down in [Brazil], many people and leaders in the church were thanking me profusely for the generations of impact that our seminary has had on their church. ... That story can be multiplied many times around the world for both seminaries."

"The LCMS is the strongest force for confessional Lutheranism in the world today," Harrison said. "We bring a theology that holds the Scriptures as God's own inerrant Word. And we bring a theology of the *Book of Concord*. Full stop. And because it agrees with the Word of God, and we care for and love people, we plant churches, we bear witness to Christ, and that is exactly what we should all be about."

Jesus Rest is Best!



Are you tired? My guess is you are. Tired of work, the news, conflict, struggles, and paying bills, maybe it's your age or life's little mundane chores!

Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart, and ye shall find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light." (Matt. 11:28 – 30 KJV) Sounds good to me! Jesus gives us rest!

Does He mean, however, no more work, bills or chores? Sorry, that's not it. He is saying though that we don't have to work hard to go to heaven. You know, thinking we have to do something good to get there. So be honest, you've thought, even been taught that God will take you to heaven because you are such a good person. You've tried to be good, tried to love too, but honestly that hasn't always worked out, right.

None of us is perfect, and Red Bull won't give us the right wings to get to heaven nor will any of those super spiritual drinks offered by those false preachers that say that heaven is just a few more good deeds away. Nor can we argue Jesus expects us to work for our salvation because He says, "Take my yoke upon you."

So, what's He referencing, in days past animals were yoked together, a young inexperienced one to an older experienced one who would show the younger the ropes which was how to make work easier which in one respect means Jesus is there to pull along with us as we strive towards our goal of heaven. He's yoked to us you see to teach us that we do not have to work hard for our salvation. Being yoked to Him, therefore, means learning about what He did for us on His cross where He shed His blood for the forgiveness of our sins. That's why He said, "Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me." The point being, Jesus wants us to learn about His free gift of grace, and how He paid the price for our sins and how He doesn't expect us to work to earn a place in heaven.

We can "rest" therefore from thinking we have to work to earn our salvation. And that yoke is easy since Jesus bore all our sins upon His cross as He says, "My

yoke is easy, and my burden light."

Far too many though think that to be a Christian means giving up their life to become a monk or something, but that's not true, although Jesus wants us to follow His commands. We cannot for instance just go about sinning with abandon denying what He says about living a Christian life. So, He says this about His yoke, "For I am meek and lowly in heart, and ye shall find rest unto your souls."

Jesus was humble and obedient to His heavenly Father and from Him we learn what obedience to our heavenly Father means. And obedience for us means resting peacefully in His work of salvation. It's a rest that comes from trusting in Jesus and what He has done to make us right before God through His sacrifice on the Cross. No one can give you His rest, you cannot choose it either. The rest that comes through faith is a gift that comes by hearing Jesus Word and in receiving His Sacraments of baptism and His Supper that impart to us what He did for us on His cross where we find the much-needed rest we are all looking for, the rest that says, because He worked the work of God to die for our sins, we don't have to work to earn our salvation!

So, like I said, Jesus isn't far, His rest is near, so hear His invitation to receive the rest He offers you.

Sermon by Martin Luther December 25th, 1522



CHRISTMAS DAY

And the Word became flesh. (John 1:14)

Christ has a holy birth, immaculate and pure. Our birth is sinful and accursed, and we can only be helped through the holy birth of Christ. Yet Christ's birth cannot be shared with us, but it is offered spiritually to everyone wherever the Word is preached. Those who firmly believe and receive it will not suffer harm because of their own sinful birth.

It was Christ's will and pleasure to be born as a man so that in him we might be born again. "In fulfillment of his own purpose he gave us birth by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of his creatures" (James 1:18). In this way Christ takes our birth away from us and immerses it in his own birth, giving us his birth, that we may be made new and clean, as if it were our own birth. Therefore shall every Christian rejoice in this birth of Christ, and glory in it, as if they too were born of Mary. The one who does not believe that, or doubts it, is no Christian.

This is the great joy of which the angel speaks. This is God's comfort and his surpassing goodness, that we (if we believe) may glory in such a treasure, that Mary be our very mother, Christ our brother, and God our father. For all these things have truly happened that we might believe in them.

See, then, that you make this birth your own, exchanging with him, so that you might be rid of your birth, and might take on his, which happens when you believe. Then you surely will rest in the virgin Mary's lap as her darling child. But you must learn to have such faith and to exercise it throughout your earthly life, for it can never be strong enough.

DECEMBER STEWARDSHIP

Repenting of "Yours" and "Mine"

Retailers have had their Christmas displays up since before Reformation Sunday. The kids have made their list and checked it twice, or three times or more. It won't be long before the tree will start shedding its needles, the stockings emptied, the gifts unwrapped, toys broken, and the too small or out of style clothes returned. Before we know it, the annual celebration of Christmas will be over.

But for the children of God, we know that the gift of Christmas doesn't ever end. Week in and week out, the Lord continues to shower His gifts on us. Every time the Lord gathers us to His house, and we are led to kneel at His table, the gift of forgiveness is repeatedly granted to us. It is nothing we deserve. It comes to us freely!

The fourth stanza of the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us Lord for Shallow Thankfulness" (*LSB* 788) highlights both this gift and our response.

Teach us, O Lord, true thankfulness divine, that gives as Christ gave, never counting cost

To learn thankfulness is necessary. The parents of young children are well-versed in the fact that they must teach their children thankfulness. It does not come naturally. The spiritual genetics inherited from our parents allow us to think that the world revolves around us. When we receive something, there is an inward desire to think that we in some way deserve it.

But there is no way that we deserve anything we get from our Lord. We need that ongoing lesson from God Himself. Thankfulness toward God is worked in us by the Holy Spirit. God's Word works this thanksgiving in us. We need this weekly reminder that Jesus didn't consider "equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself" for us, to the point of death on a cross (Phil. 2:6). He didn't bat an eye. He paid the price! Our life of stewardship is one of daily and weekly thanksgiving inspired by the Lord Himself.

That knows no barrier of "yours" and "mine," assured that only what's withheld is lost.

Because Jesus gave us everything and more, there can be no ownership. The child at Christmas is quick to claim that the newly gifted toy is "mine!" But as Psalm 24:1 asserts, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein." There isn't anything in creation that is ours. When we cling to and claim ownership of anything in creation, we are losing out on the continual gifts with which the Lord desires to shower upon us. Closed hands cannot receive anything new. We cling to the old and dead and miss the new thing that the Lord desires to do in and for us.

We are led to repent of the "yours" and "mine" and remove the lie that we have any ownership. In this we have the promise that God will continue to give to us. Not just at Christmas, but every Sunday at the altar in the Lord's house.


